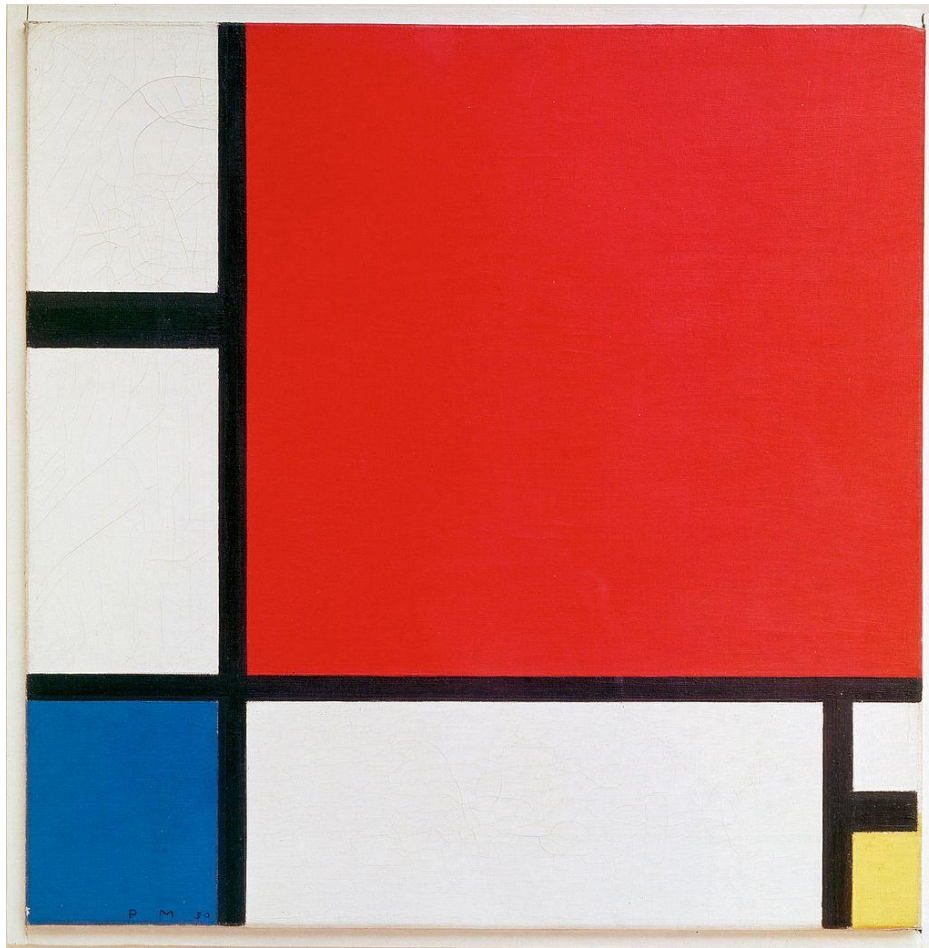


Mrs Campbell's Artwork of the Week -Wk3

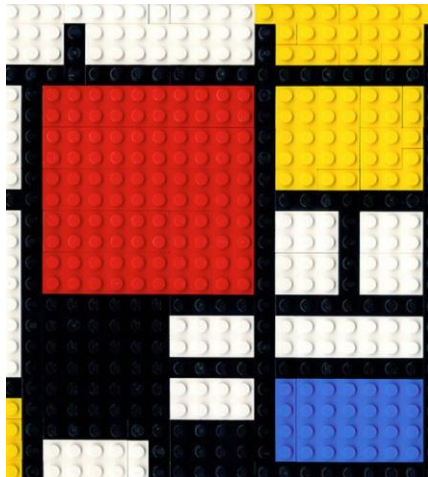

Art Challenge

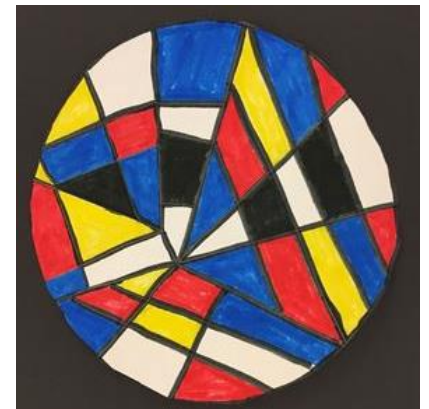
Why not try one of these-
